



## **DECREE**

### **IN THE NAME OF GOD. AMEN**

#### **An extinctive union of a public juridic person in virtue of c. 121 (CIC '83)**

Considering the good of the whole Diocese of Joliet<sup>1</sup>:

1. Due to changing demographics in the geographic region of the Diocese of Joliet, the Catholic population has been undergoing significant changes over the past years. Consequently, this has had a negative impact on the sacramental life of the faithful in the Diocese. The statistics demonstrate the large decrease in priests: there are 50% fewer active diocesan priests today than there were in 1970; there are 65.4% fewer religious priests today than there were in 1970; there are 81.2% fewer seminarians today than there were in 1970; the ratio of active priests to parishioners in 2023 was 1 to 5,515, whereas in 1970 this ratio was 1 to 1,680. The statistics also demonstrate that there are fewer sacraments being celebrated: infant Baptisms have decreased by 50.2% since 2000; First Communion have decreased by 35.6% since 2000; Confirmations have decreased by 14.1% since 2010; and Catholic marriages have decreased by 58.2% since 1990.
2. The significant demographic shifts over the past years have also impacted the economics of the Diocese. Today, many parishes in the Diocese are unable to financially support themselves. Their aging church buildings require tremendous financial resources to be maintained, and in the United States there is no government assistance provided to help maintain them. For many parishes, the total cost to maintain their buildings together with all other parish expenses are impossible to sustain.
3. According to 2023 data, the region of South Will County and Grundy County consists of a total population of 37,489 persons, only a small portion of which are Catholics, and its overall projected growth is only 0.6% by the year 2028. This geographic region makes up approximately 675 square miles of the 4,218 square miles of the entire Diocese of Joliet, and there are currently nineteen (19) parishes serving Christ's faithful.

Reasons for modifying this particular parish (*ad rem*)<sup>2</sup>:

1. This Decree concerns **St. Patrick Parish, 14936 W. Wilmington/Peotone Road, Wilton Center, IL 60442-0062**, established in 1905.
2. In an eleven year period, from 2013 to 2024, the Mass attendance at St. Patrick's has decreased by 17%. In the calendar year of 2024, the following sacramental statistics were recorded: three (3) baptisms; zero (0) first communions; four (4) confirmations; zero (0) marriages; zero (0) funerals.
3. Since 2019, the operating parish offertory budget has only increased by a total of 6.6% (\$6,787) and it would have lost more money if it had to support its own pastor. For nine (9) years, since 2016, St. Patrick has shared a pastor with St. Rose of Lima Parish, Wilmington, IL.
4. According to can. 50, *CIC* '83, two consultations with the parishioners and the pastor of St. Patrick occurred on October 1, 2024 and November 5, 2024. In these consultations, parishioners were informed that a restructuring of the parish could occur. Furthermore, possible canonical scenarios were provided to them, and they were invited to submit alternative scenarios. They were asked to provide feedback which was subsequently submitted to the committee who reviewed and discussed it.
5. The principal motivation for modifying this parish is a concern for souls and the good of the faithful. This modification must be undertaken so as to serve the good of Christ's faithful, namely, to continue to provide them His sacraments. In order that Christ's faithful will continue to have access to the sacraments, on a regular and consistent basis, the modification of this parish will be in the form of an extinctive union (amalgamation). Thus, St. Joseph Parish, Manhattan, IL, being geographically nearby (8.3 miles), having a steady number of administered sacraments in the deanery, being financially viable, having a similar cultural demographic, and having the capacity for the faithful to worship and receive the sacraments, the decision was made to unite St. Patrick Parish with St. Joseph Parish.

THEREFORE, I, The Most Reverend Ronald A. Hicks, Bishop of the Diocese of Joliet-in-Illinois, in accord with the canons 121, 127 §1 & §3, 166, 515 §2 of the Code of Canon Law (*CIC* '83), convened the Presbyteral Council of the Diocese of Joliet on February 13, 2025 at the Blanchette Catholic Center in Crest Hill Illinois. Having heard the Presbyteral Council at the same meeting, which voted unanimously in favor of all the points outlined in the proposal I, after invoking the Holy Spirit,

***hereby decree the following:***

1. Effective July 1, 2025, the abovementioned St. Patrick Parish will be extinguished as a separate juridic person and united with St. Joseph Parish, 235 W. North Street, Manhattan, IL 60442-0025, whereby the juridic person of St. Patrick Parish will be extinguished and only the juridic person of St. Joseph will remain;

2. The territorial boundaries of the extinguished St. Patrick Parish will be subsumed into the territorial boundaries of St. Joseph Parish. The territory of St. Joseph Parish will be as depicted in the map and written description;
3. Each and all the parishioners of St. Patrick Parish, along with the faithful domiciled within the new parish boundaries, will be parishioners of St. Joseph Parish;
4. Subject to the intention of the founders and donors, with due regard for acquired rights, the goods and patrimonial rights of St. Patrick Parish, together with any obligations with which they may be burdened, will be those of the remaining parish, St. Joseph;
5. The church of the extinguished St. Patrick Parish will be the church of St. Joseph Parish, and St. Joseph church will be designated the parish church of the parish;
6. The sacramental records and other materials relevant to historical research concerning the extinguished parish of St. Patrick will be collected and maintained at the St. Joseph church campus, unless otherwise determined by the expert staff from the Archives of the Diocese of Joliet;
7. The notification of this decree shall be communicated to the pastors of St. Patrick Parish and St. Joseph Parish as well as to their parishioners. Notification will be given through the parish bulletins (or other suitable means) and the official website of the Diocese of Joliet.

*Before hierarchical recourse may be taken against this decree, a petition to reconsider or amend the decree must be sent or delivered to me within ten (10) useful days from notification of the decree (CIC '83 cc. 1734; 1735; 1737) at the Blanchette Catholic Center, 16555 Weber Rd., Crest Hill, IL 60403.*
